This guide is designed to prepare students for their cultural field trip and to facilitate class discussion afterwards.

The guide contains information on all the short films:

- Basic information including the film's title, country of origin, duration year, type and the name(s) of the filmmaker(s);
- The film's synopsis and main themes;
- A simple question that can guide students in their viewing;
- A space for students to rate the film on a five-star scale:
- Ideas to help prepare and develop the students' contextual or cinematographic knowledge of the film.

At the beginning of the guide is a film-vocabulary toolbox to help with the understanding and meaning of the film.

At the end of the guide there are complementary activities to be done after watching the films.

Finally, the last part contains answers to the questions posed in the booklet, and maybe in the activities or discussions. Easy to spot, they're there to help, so no cheating!





If you would like to see the films again in class, they will be available online from March 24 until the end of the school year. Teachers, watch your inbox for access info!

- Allowing students who were absent to see the films;
- Including one or more films in the evaluation of a skill;
- Rewatching the class's favourite films;
- And more!

Preparing for a trip to REGARD



During the school trip, don't forget to...

- Greet the members of the REGARD team, including volunteers, when you meet them;
- Stay seated throughout the screening;
- Go to the washroom BEFORE the activity starts;
- Open your eyes, ears and heart to fully experience the films;
- Save your comments and reactions for the credits.

It is normal to feel all kinds of emotions during the screening, because cinema is art! Some films will make you feel a stronger response than others. You might even want to share your reaction with your friends sitting nearby. However, since the films are very short, please stay silent except during the credits so as not to disturb others.

At the REGARD Festival, values of equity, inclusion and diversity are very important. Please show respect and openness to the many different points of view depicted in the films. There will be no tolerance for hateful behaviour or statements before, during or after the films.

The art of reading subtitles

As you know, this program is 100% in English. To help you understand everything, we've arranged for English subtitles to be included. It isn't always easy to absorb all the visual information on-screen when you're reading the dialogue. Here are some tips for making the most of the screening:

- As in any somewhat stressful situation, it's best to breathe through your nose. It isn't a big deal if you don't understand every word.
- The subtitles are there to help with comprehension. Let the images and characters' body language guide you. If needed, you can choose to scan only a few key words from the subtitles.
- A film is a work of art, which means you aren't required to understand precisely what the filmmaker is trying to say. You're completely free to appreciate the film in your own way.





Toolbox

The world of cinema is full of words you may not know. Don't panic, here's a toolbox that will help you understand all the nuances of cinema!



Keywords

Synopsis

A short, simple summary of a film that helps the reader get an idea of what the film is about without getting into too much detail.

Screenplay

A written guide, template or detailed plan of what's going to happen in the film. Scene by scene, it describes all the action, dialogue and settings.

Soundtrack

The music and sound effects that accompany the images on screen. For example, when you hear birds singing or the Boom! of an explosion, that's part of the soundtrack.

Subtitles

The written text at the bottom of the screen when the spoken dialogue of the film is not your own. The subtitles tell you what the characters are saying in the film, in your language, so even if you don't understand what's being said, you can still enjoy the story.

Review

A text written by someone, usually a film critic, to assess a film's overall quality and determine whether or not they think the film is worth recommending. The critic takes into account the story, the actors and actresses, the music, the special effects, and so on. Critics rate films with stars, just like in your notebook!





Toolbox



Professions

Actor and actress

A person whose profession is to play roles in films, plays or on television. When you see characters on screen, or on stage, actors and actresses play them.

Director

The person who controls a film's artistic and dramatic aspects and visualizes the screenplay (or script). He or she decides everything, from which actors and actresses should be chosen, to where the camera should be placed and what music will make the film more exciting.

Scriptwriter

The person who writes the story of the film! They write the script, or screenplay.

Props person

The person responsible for the props and objects needed in the making of a film. For example, if a character needs a tennis racket, it's up to the props person to find one.

Camera operator

The person who physically carries and operates the camera during the shooting of a film. They are usually responsible for making the technical decisions related to the image so that everything is properly captured on screen.





Toolbox



Genres

Documentary

Non-fiction films telling true stories about real people, places or events. In these types of films, you'll see images that show the reality of what's happening in the world, and there's often a person narrating to help explain what you're seeing.

Animation

The creation of characters and entire worlds using drawings, computers or even objects.

Fiction

Unlike documentaries, fiction films are based on an invented story with imaginary characters portrayed by actors and actresses.

Experimental

Experimental films use cinema to create a work of art that does not necessarily tell a story. They often highlight other art forms.

Adeline Kerry Cruz is a young Montreal dancer who was 7 years old during the filming. Now 11, she is known worldwide for her talent in krumping – she even danced in the opening ceremony of the Paris Olympics! You can learn more about her by looking at her **instagram profile**.

Did you know that krump stands for *Kingdom Radically Uplifted Mighty Praise*? This dance was popularized in the United States during the early 2000s by African-American dancers, and is known for expressing a lot of emotions through energetic movements.


Inge and her family travel in a van year round – it's how they live. Would you like to try living that way?

Now, with all this information you're officially a capybara expert! You know about their habits, size and even their secrets. You're ready to watch the film and see them in action!






In the film, the capybaras and the chickens have a difficult start but wind up helping each other. Together, they leave for a better place, united like one big family even though they aren't the same species.

A sheet of music was left on a composer's work desk. A music-loving fly comes and places its leg there. She twirls and begins to sow discord. On the other side of the sheet, a spider does not intend to miss such a great opportunity for a feast.

Question

What happens to the sheet of music at the end of the film?

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The film is set to music by Maxence Camelin, who has composed original scores for the films of Nicolas Bianco-Levrin since 2011.

Long-term collaborations between composers and short filmmakers are not unusual. It's a phenomenon also seen in the world of feature films. For example:

- Miyazaki and Joe Hisaishi (My Neighbor Totoro, Princess Mononoke, Spirited Away, etc.).
- Tim Burton and Danny Elfman (Batman, Edward Scissorhands, The Nightmare Before Christmas)
- Steven Spielberg and John Williams (Jaws, E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial, Indiana Jones, Jurassic Park).

These duos are perfect examples of the importance of music in cinema. The relationship between director and composer often goes beyond simple collaborative work, becoming a true audio signature that shapes the identity of the films.





A little help



Musical notes help us know when to sing or play, and each note has a different duration! Here are a few symbols and what they mean:

- 1. Quarter rest (soupir): A short pause, brief silence.
- 2. **Eighth note** (croche): A note lasting half as long as a quarter rest.
- 3. **Beamed eighth notes** (deux croches): Two eighth notes in quick succession!
- 4. **Quarter note** (noire): A longer note, lasting one beat.
- 5. Half note (blanche): An even longer note, lasting two beats.

Question

Why did the woman think Elvira was dead?





Elvira is a detective film. This is a long-running genre that has a very specific set of elements (known as *tropes*). Do you know some of them? Here are some examples:

- Anxious music;
- Suspense;
- A detective, a criminal and a victim;
- A misdeed or a crime;
- A precise investigation;
- Tight shots that don't let us see the whole room;
- A twist ending.

Now that you know some detective-movie tropes, think about them and identify as many as you can while watching the film.

Do you know what sustainable development is? This short video gives a good explanation.


What actions do you take to ensure a sustainable future for the environment?

When a video of kids dancing in the rain goes viral, it brings global attention to an unlikely ballet school outside Lagos, Nigeria. Now, Daniel Ajala – who learned ballet over YouTube – is training students to perform on the world stage.

Question

The film's title references Daniel's motto, which he shares with his students: "First (...) Then comes the body." What's the first part?

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




Did you know that ballet originated in Italy? That's where this style of dance emerged before being adopted by the French and evolving into the classical ballet that we know today.

Classical ballet is a very complex and technically difficult discipline. Years or practice are needed to master the art, and to become a professional dancer it is necessary to get into a prominent ballet school.

In this film, you will see how ballet can be done in a completely different setting. It shows that when you have a passion and dreams, anything becomes possible. Even outside the usual setting, things can be done not just well but maybe even better!





Post-viewing

Did you notice how important the dance teacher is in his students' lives? Is there someone in your life who's an inspiring mentor?

Write a letter to them to tell them how much you appreciate them.





Context

The films in this program come from a wide range of places. Only *Sit Still* was made in **Quebec!** The other **Canadian** film, *Elvira*, was filmed in **Prince Edward Island**.

The fictional film *Travelling Past* was filmed in two countries: the **United Kingdom** and **Spain**.

The director of *Los Carpinchos*, Alfredo Soderguit, is an illustrator, author and animator living in Uruguay, which explains the film's Spanish title.

Acrobats and Zizanizz are two films whose crews come from France.


Jocelyn Garcia, the director of *Tule*, has a multicultural heritage: her family is both Mexican-American (United States citizens with roots in Mexico) and members of the Pomo Nation (an Indigenous people from Northern California). In this film she chose to honour Pomo traditions.

Finally, the documentary *Then Comes The Body* was filmed in Lagos, the biggest city in Nigeria, a country in West Africa. The director, Jacob Krupnick, is an American specializing in films about dance.



Sit Still

Why is the title of the film Sit Still?

"Sit still" is something children often hear from adults at school. In the film, the young dancer does the opposite: she expresses herself through movement - in a school!

What happens to the sheet of music at the end of the film?

The bottle of ink is spilled on it, making it invisible.

Can you recognize these elements?

- a) Eighth note. This is a really fast note! Imagine clapping your hands together quickly.
- b) Beamed eighth notes. Two eighth notes in a row, like clapping your hands fast, twice.
- c) Sharp symbol. When you see this next to a note, it means it needs to be at a slightly higher pitch than usual. You can think of it as a note standing on tiptoes!
